<p style="text-align: right;">2</p> <p>1 BOARD MEMBERS</p> <p>2</p> <p>3 David Medine, Chairman</p> <p>4 Rachel Brand</p> <p>5 Elisebeth Bridget Collins</p> <p>6 James Dempsey</p> <p>7 Patricia Wald</p> <p>8</p> <p>9</p> <p>10</p> <p>11</p> <p>12</p> <p>13</p> <p>14</p> <p>15</p> <p>16</p> <p>17</p> <p>18</p> <p>19</p> <p>20</p> <p>21</p> <p>22</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">4</p> <p>1 Executive Order 12333.</p> <p>2 Last July, PCLOB announced that it was</p> <p>3 going to engage in oversight of counterterrorism</p> <p>4 activities conducted under Executive Order 12333.</p> <p>5 Executive Order 12333 establishes the</p> <p>6 overall framework for the conduct of intelligence</p> <p>7 activities by U.S. intelligence agencies.</p> <p>8 The purpose of today's meeting is for</p> <p>9 the Board to consider and vote on a proposed plan</p> <p>10 of action for oversight of counterterrorism</p> <p>11 activities conducted under 12333.</p> <p>12 The Board has already received briefings</p> <p>13 from the majority of the elements of the</p> <p>14 Intelligence Community to provide an overview of</p> <p>15 their implementation of 12333, and within the</p> <p>16 next few months it will receive complete</p> <p>17 briefings with the remaining Intelligence</p> <p>18 Community elements.</p> <p>19 In addition, the Board has held follow-</p> <p>20 up briefings with some of the most significant</p> <p>21 collecting agencies, including the CIA, NSA, FBI,</p> <p>22 and Defense Intelligence Agency. These follow-up</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">3</p> <p>1 PROCEEDINGS</p> <p>2 CHAIRMAN MEDINE: Good morning. This is</p> <p>3 a meeting of the Privacy and Civil Liberties</p> <p>4 Oversight Board. The time is 10:03 a.m., on</p> <p>5 April 8th, 2015. We are meeting at 2100 K</p> <p>6 Street, N.W., Room 214, in Washington, D.C.</p> <p>7 This meeting was announced in the</p> <p>8 Federal Register on March 27th, 2015. As</p> <p>9 Chairman, I called this meeting and will be the</p> <p>10 presiding officer.</p> <p>11 All five Board members are present and</p> <p>12 there is a quorum. The Board members are Rachel</p> <p>13 Brand, Elisebeth Collins, James Dempsey and</p> <p>14 Patricia Wald.</p> <p>15 I'd now call the hearing to order. All</p> <p>16 in favor of opening the meeting, please say aye.</p> <p>17 (Vote Taken)</p> <p>18 CHAIRMAN MEDINE: Upon receiving</p> <p>19 unanimous consent to proceed, we will now</p> <p>20 proceed.</p> <p>21 The Board is convened today to discuss</p> <p>22 and vote on a proposed project plan for review of</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">5</p> <p>1 briefings have focused more closely on the</p> <p>2 specific counterterrorism activities that those</p> <p>3 agencies conduct pursuant to the executive order.</p> <p>4 The Board has also received and examined</p> <p>5 the Attorney General-approved procedures and</p> <p>6 other implementing materials that govern 12333</p> <p>7 activities of these agencies.</p> <p>8 Given the range of counterterrorism</p> <p>9 activities conducted under 12333, the Board</p> <p>10 expects to be conducting oversight of those</p> <p>11 activities long after the work covered by today's</p> <p>12 proposed plan is completed.</p> <p>13 After I've briefly described the key</p> <p>14 points of this proposed plan, each Board member</p> <p>15 will be given the opportunity to express their</p> <p>16 views, after which a recorded vote will be taken.</p> <p>17 As a preliminary matter, the Board is</p> <p>18 very cognizant that its jurisdiction is over</p> <p>19 efforts to protect the nation from terrorism and</p> <p>20 that E.O. 12333 covers activities going well</p> <p>21 beyond counterterrorism. The proposed plan is</p> <p>22 accordingly limited to counterterrorism-related</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">6</p> <p>1 matters.</p> <p>2 There are three key elements to the</p> <p>3 proposed plan. First, the Board will conduct</p> <p>4 examination of deep dives of two specific</p> <p>5 activities undertaken pursuant to 12333. In</p> <p>6 other words, based on what it learns in the</p> <p>7 briefings it has had and will receive, the Board</p> <p>8 will select two counterterrorism activities</p> <p>9 focusing on the NSA and CIA for in-depth</p> <p>10 examination and consideration of whether the need</p> <p>11 for the activity is appropriately balanced with</p> <p>12 the need to protect privacy and civil liberties.</p> <p>13 These examinations will be analogous to</p> <p>14 the work that the Board has done in its review of</p> <p>15 the 215 and 702 programs. The goal is to</p> <p>16 complete the two examinations and prepare reports</p> <p>17 on each of these by the end of 2015.</p> <p>18 While we anticipate that the deep dives</p> <p>19 may have to be largely or entirely classified</p> <p>20 given the nature of the activities being</p> <p>21 examined, the Board will assess whether to seek</p> <p>22 public interest declassification of sufficient</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">8</p> <p>1 Board's public report will also assess the</p> <p>2 adequacy of E.O. 12333's safeguards in protecting</p> <p>3 privacy and civil liberties.</p> <p>4 I favor adoption of the plan. I believe</p> <p>5 that doing two deep dives on the particular</p> <p>6 counterterrorism activities is important to</p> <p>7 developing the Board's understanding of how such</p> <p>8 activities are conducted under 12333. Focusing</p> <p>9 on two agencies, the CIA and NSA, will give us</p> <p>10 different perspectives on those activities.</p> <p>11 It's also consistent with our mission to</p> <p>12 educate the public. Despite the importance of</p> <p>13 Executive Order 12333, remarkably few people</p> <p>14 understand just what it is or how it shapes the</p> <p>15 Intelligence Community's activities.</p> <p>16 Therefore, the Board now has the</p> <p>17 opportunity to serve a valuable educational</p> <p>18 function by exploring in a public report what</p> <p>19 12333 is all about and what implications it has</p> <p>20 for privacy and civil liberties.</p> <p>21 However, the Board's mission is not just</p> <p>22 to describe what it finds, but to thoroughly</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">7</p> <p>1 classified information to permit a public report</p> <p>2 to be issued on either or both of the deep dives.</p> <p>3 Second, the Board will produce a public</p> <p>4 report explaining just what 12333 is and how its</p> <p>5 legal framework and implementing procedures</p> <p>6 govern the collection and the use of information</p> <p>7 about Americans.</p> <p>8 The Board may also use the information</p> <p>9 obtained during the course of the two in-depth</p> <p>10 examinations to inform its public report.</p> <p>11 To the extent possible and appropriate</p> <p>12 in an unclassified document, the Board may seek</p> <p>13 to rely on these examinations for descriptive</p> <p>14 examples of how 12333 and its implementing</p> <p>15 procedures provide limits on some activities,</p> <p>16 authorization for others, impose procedural</p> <p>17 requirements, and protect privacy and civil</p> <p>18 liberties.</p> <p>19 Third, as appropriate and to the extent</p> <p>20 the Board can draw conclusions based on its two</p> <p>21 in-depth reviews and the information it receives</p> <p>22 from the rest of the Intelligence Community, the</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">9</p> <p>1 conduct meaningful oversight. The Board's job is</p> <p>2 to apply its expertise and independent</p> <p>3 perspective to analyzing and reviewing</p> <p>4 counterterrorism actions to ensure that the need</p> <p>5 for such actions is balanced with the need to</p> <p>6 protect privacy and civil liberties, including,</p> <p>7 as appropriate, whether the safeguards found</p> <p>8 under 12333 in this context are adequate.</p> <p>9 Accordingly, I hereby move adoption of</p> <p>10 proposed 12333 plan, and I now turn to my fellow</p> <p>11 Board members to express their views on the</p> <p>12 proposed plan, after which a vote will be taken.</p> <p>13 I'm starting with Board member Rachel</p> <p>14 Brand.</p> <p>15 MS. BRAND: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.</p> <p>16 I first would like to thank the staff of</p> <p>17 the Board for all their hard work on this</p> <p>18 project. It can be challenging to serve a</p> <p>19 multi-member body, and I know that this project</p> <p>20 was no exception.</p> <p>21 Before I express my views on the</p> <p>22 particular document before the Board, I would</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">10</p> <p>1 like to take a step back and make some comments 2 about where this project fits within the Board's 3 broader mission.</p> <p>4 As the first members of this Board, we 5 have a responsibility to establish the 6 credibility and effectiveness of this 7 institution. All of our individual projects, 8 including the one before the Board today, must be 9 undertaken with this long-term view.</p> <p>10 To be an effective institution we will 11 need credibility, not only with the public but 12 with Congress and with the intelligence agencies 13 we are directed to oversee and advise.</p> <p>14 A lack of credibility with the 15 Intelligence Community agencies in particular 16 would significantly limit the likelihood that our 17 recommendations will be adopted.</p> <p>18 This would be a shame, because we can 19 add real value where we can convince the agencies 20 to make concrete changes that better protect 21 privacy and civil liberties without compromising 22 national security.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">12</p> <p>1 a particular intelligence program.</p> <p>2 The second was an ability to be 3 independent and critical without being a 4 reflexive antagonist of the Intelligence 5 Community.</p> <p>6 The fact that the government has already 7 implemented or begun to implement almost all of 8 our recommendations demonstrates the power of 9 well-considered, targeted recommendations to 10 effect change.</p> <p>11 This leads me to the matter at hand, 12 which is the Board's review of certain collection 13 activities conducted under Executive Order 12333.</p> <p>14 Last July, the Board announced it would 15 begin to look at Executive Order 12333. Because 16 we did not qualify that statement in any way, we 17 gave some in the public and the agencies the 18 impression that we intended to conduct an omnibus 19 review of everything the government does under 20 the executive order. This was mistaken for at 21 least three reasons.</p> <p>22 First, much, perhaps most of the</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">11</p> <p>1 Our institutional credibility is even 2 more important to our success in discharging our 3 statutory advice function. We are an independent 4 agency. Because we do not sit within an 5 Intelligence Community element observing the flow 6 of daily business, programs to which our advice 7 would be relevant will not come to our attention 8 unless agencies choose to seek out our advice.</p> <p>9 They will do so only if they view us as 10 a serious, thoughtful body committed to helping 11 them both protect national security and preserve 12 liberty.</p> <p>13 We took this approach in our reports on 14 the program under Section 702 of FISA and the 15 bulk telephony metadata program under Section 215 16 of the Patriot Act.</p> <p>17 Although I disagreed with and voted 18 against two central conclusions of the Board's 19 report on the Section 215 program, I believe that 20 the combination of these reports demonstrated two 21 things. One was the capacity to be 22 simultaneously focused and thorough in reviewing</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">13</p> <p>1 activity governed by Executive Order 12333 is 2 outside the Board's statutory jurisdiction. The 3 Board, as the Chairman just mentioned, is limited 4 to reviewing the government's counterterrorism 5 activities.</p> <p>6 Executive Order 12333, however, governs 7 not just counterterrorism activities, but all 8 foreign intelligence-related activities, 9 including those that serve foreign relations, 10 counterintelligence, counterproliferation, and 11 traditional defense functions.</p> <p>12 Second, it would be impossible for the 13 Board to review everything that happens under 14 Executive Order 12333 because it governs 15 literally everything the Intelligence Community 16 does, from signals intelligence, to military 17 intelligence supporting combat operations, to 18 covert action, and on and on.</p> <p>19 Executive Order 12333 is not a discrete 20 collection program like the Section 215 and 702 21 collection programs. It is not a program at all. 22 It does not even provide legal authority in the</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">14</p> <p>1 way that Sections 215 and 702 do.</p> <p>2 Rather, it is a foundational document</p> <p>3 that provides a construct for the Intelligence</p> <p>4 Community. Its primary provisions divide</p> <p>5 responsibilities among the intelligence agencies,</p> <p>6 dictating, for example, that NSA has the lead on</p> <p>7 signals intelligence and CIA has the lead on</p> <p>8 human intelligence. But Executive Order 12333 is</p> <p>9 not the basis for the agency's authority to</p> <p>10 conduct signals intelligence or human</p> <p>11 intelligence.</p> <p>12 The executive order also provides that</p> <p>13 agencies must protect information collected about</p> <p>14 U.S. persons and requires the Attorney General</p> <p>15 and the agencies to adopt further guidelines and</p> <p>16 rules to protect U.S. persons.</p> <p>17 The third reason why it was a mistake to</p> <p>18 leave the impression that the Board was about to</p> <p>19 conduct one omnibus review of Executive Order</p> <p>20 12333 is that reviewing activities governed by</p> <p>21 the executive order should not be just one short-</p> <p>22 term project for the Board.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">16</p> <p>1 and make recommendations for changes to that</p> <p>2 program if we find any to be necessary.</p> <p>3 I'm happy to note that the document</p> <p>4 before the Board today does several things with</p> <p>5 which I agree.</p> <p>6 First, it states that reviewing programs</p> <p>7 under Executive Order 12333 will be part of the</p> <p>8 Board's ongoing work, and it makes clear that we</p> <p>9 need not tackle all 12333-governed activity in</p> <p>10 one report. It also states that in the</p> <p>11 short-term we will identify two specific programs</p> <p>12 for in-depth review and report. Importantly, it</p> <p>13 makes clear that we will not exceed our statutory</p> <p>14 limitation to the government's counterterrorism</p> <p>15 activities.</p> <p>16 It also makes clear that we will focus</p> <p>17 on collection programs with attributes that have</p> <p>18 civil liberties or privacy implications. And it</p> <p>19 acknowledges that the Board's reports on these</p> <p>20 programs are likely to be largely, if not wholly,</p> <p>21 classified due to their sensitive nature.</p> <p>22 For these reasons, on its face, this</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">15</p> <p>1 Because many of the counterterrorism</p> <p>2 activities that fall within the Board's</p> <p>3 jurisdiction are governed by the executive order,</p> <p>4 reviewing such programs is something the Board</p> <p>5 will be doing for the long-term, while also</p> <p>6 conducting other projects. We should not be in a</p> <p>7 rush to bite it off all at once to satisfy an</p> <p>8 external demand that we review Executive Order</p> <p>9 12333. That would not further our goal of</p> <p>10 establishing the Board's long-term credibility.</p> <p>11 In my view, we should begin to review</p> <p>12 12333-governed programs one or two at a time,</p> <p>13 while we also continue to review counterterrorism</p> <p>14 programs conducted under FISA or programs that</p> <p>15 fall outside of Executive Order 12333 because</p> <p>16 they are conducted by non-Intelligence Community</p> <p>17 agencies. We should do the same kind of thorough</p> <p>18 review of those programs as we did of the Section</p> <p>19 215 and 702 programs.</p> <p>20 When our study of each program is</p> <p>21 complete, we should analyze the privacy and civil</p> <p>22 liberties implications of that particular program</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">17</p> <p>1 document is fairly close to something I could</p> <p>2 support. However, I will vote against the</p> <p>3 document because it does not foreclose some</p> <p>4 directions in which this project could go.</p> <p>5 My primary concern is with the third</p> <p>6 report contemplated by this document, which is a</p> <p>7 more general report about Executive Order 12333</p> <p>8 and its implementing structures.</p> <p>9 The exact nature and purpose of this</p> <p>10 third report remain unclear to me. The text of</p> <p>11 the document before the Board today leaves open</p> <p>12 the possibility that the third report might</p> <p>13 attempt to make judgements about the overall</p> <p>14 adequacy of the privacy and civil liberties</p> <p>15 protections in Executive Order 12333 and its</p> <p>16 implementing rules.</p> <p>17 I could not support that. It simply</p> <p>18 would not be possible to analyze, for example,</p> <p>19 the adequacy of oversight mechanisms for all</p> <p>20 12333-governed activities, many of which fall</p> <p>21 outside our statutory jurisdiction, after having</p> <p>22 reviewed only two programs. We could certainly</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">18</p> <p>1 analyze the adequacy of oversight mechanisms in 2 each program we reviewed, but if we tried to 3 extrapolate from our reviews of two programs to 4 arrive at more general conclusions, we would risk 5 being incomplete or simply wrong. We would also 6 risk undermining the institutional credibility 7 that I believe we have a duty to establish and 8 steward. I would have liked this document to 9 clarify that the third report will not do that. 10 The fact that that clarification was not included 11 in this document gives me significant pause. 12 I am also concerned about the document's 13 statement that the third report will be public. 14 Whether or not the report can be written 15 unclassified will depend on its contents. 16 If, as the document before the Board 17 contemplates, the Board drew upon examples from 18 the classified programs we reviewed, then it is 19 not clear that the report could be published 20 entirely unclassified. 21 This Board's ability to effect concrete 22 change in particular programs will be diminished</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">20</p> <p>1 adopt these important procedures, it will be 2 essential not only that they provide a workable 3 mechanism for arriving at a clear Board decision, 4 but that they recognize and respect the rights 5 and responsibilities of each Board member as an 6 independent, Senate-confirmed officer. Again, I 7 look forward to working with my colleagues to 8 that end. 9 Thank you. 10 CHAIRMAN MEDINE: Ms. Collins. 11 MS. COLLINS: So first and foremost, I 12 wanted to recognize our agency staff for the 13 hours of work that have led up to the meeting 14 this morning and our consideration of a proposed 15 work plan. 16 I would also like to thank my fellow 17 Board members for their dedication to developing 18 a workable path forward in this important area. 19 Before I record my vote this morning, I 20 would like to offer a brief explanation as to why 21 I can support this proposal, and also say a few 22 words about what I believe must be our highest</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">19</p> <p>1 if we foreclose the possibility of making 2 classified recommendations to the agencies and to 3 the President. 4 I hope that my concerns will not be 5 borne out and that the three reports contemplated 6 by the document will turn out to be reports that 7 I can support. 8 I look forward to working with my 9 colleagues in reviewing the programs governed by 10 Executive Order 12333 and in drafting the 11 resulting reports, and I hope that I will be able 12 to vote to adopt those reports when the time 13 comes. 14 My final point is procedural. The Board 15 continues to lack basic internal processes. It 16 has been extremely challenging to start a new 17 agency from scratch with no parent entity, but 18 the time has come to finalize procedures that 19 will enable us to operate as a mature 20 organization. 21 This must be a top priority for the 22 Board in the near term. As the Board works to</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">21</p> <p>1 priority going forward, which is regularizing our 2 internal processes and our interactions with the 3 agencies within the Intelligence Community, the 4 White House, and our congressional committees of 5 oversight. 6 It is unfortunate that our path forward 7 was arrived at in spite of our ad hoc process, 8 rather than pursuant to clear and consistent 9 procedures appropriate for a permanent executive 10 branch agency governed by five independent Board 11 members. 12 Last July, we announced as part of our 13 agenda that we would be looking at Executive 14 Order 12333. We had just completed reports on 15 two discrete programs authorized pursuant to the 16 Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act and it was 17 time to transition the agency to its longer term 18 mission and goals. 19 This agenda item reflected the reality 20 that authority for significant portions of what 21 the intelligence agencies do derives from 22 congressional enactments, or reflects the</p>

22	<p>1 President's inherent Article II authority.</p> <p>2 These activities are conducted within</p> <p>3 the framework of E.O. 12333, which, for lack of a</p> <p>4 better phrase, provides both the rules of the</p> <p>5 road for agencies conducting foreign intelligence</p> <p>6 activities and also provides an initial framework</p> <p>7 for privacy protections of U.S. persons.</p> <p>8 E.O. 12333 is not a program like the</p> <p>9 Section 215 or Section 702 programs, nor do we</p> <p>10 intend to approach it as such.</p> <p>11 We began our transition away from</p> <p>12 assessing the 215 and 702 programs with</p> <p>13 comprehensive briefings from agencies within the</p> <p>14 Intelligence Community about the scope of their</p> <p>15 foreign intelligence activities.</p> <p>16 And here, I would like to take a moment</p> <p>17 to thank those agencies for their cooperation</p> <p>18 throughout that initial process. I hope we can</p> <p>19 have that same level of cooperation going</p> <p>20 forward.</p> <p>21 Our work plan sets forth our next steps,</p> <p>22 and I support that plan for several reasons.</p>	24	<p>1 or that there will be recommendations made at the</p> <p>2 end of the review.</p> <p>3 Third, the work plan acknowledges that</p> <p>4 the activities we anticipate assessing are highly</p> <p>5 classified. We therefore do not commit to a</p> <p>6 public report on specific activities, or commit</p> <p>7 to pushing for declassification.</p> <p>8 Instead, we reserve those decisions for</p> <p>9 the end of our review to ensure that any</p> <p>10 decisions made on public disclosure will have the</p> <p>11 benefit of a full and comprehensive study.</p> <p>12 Finally, I support the proposal as</p> <p>13 drafted because I believe there is a public value</p> <p>14 in potentially clarifying, or demystifying</p> <p>15 popular misconceptions about Executive Order</p> <p>16 12333, as we did through our work with respect to</p> <p>17 the Section 702 program.</p> <p>18 The 12333 framework has been the</p> <p>19 approach of numerous Presidents to organizing and</p> <p>20 dividing responsibility in the Intelligence</p> <p>21 Community, and restricting those activities, and</p> <p>22 the American people should understand the</p>
23	<p>1 While our work in this area may have begun with</p> <p>2 an effort to obtain foundational knowledge as to</p> <p>3 the broader activities, this proposal recognizes</p> <p>4 that the scope of our assessment needs to fit</p> <p>5 soundly within the Board's enabling statute,</p> <p>6 which is limited to advice and oversight with</p> <p>7 respect to federal government actions taken to</p> <p>8 protect the nation against terror.</p> <p>9 So the proposal appropriately sets forth</p> <p>10 an anticipated review of specified</p> <p>11 counterterrorism activities, reflecting our</p> <p>12 limited role in the executive branch oversight</p> <p>13 infrastructure.</p> <p>14 Relatedly, we have identified an</p> <p>15 anticipated focus on specified key aspects of</p> <p>16 those activities. For example, the potential for</p> <p>17 incidental collection of U.S. person information</p> <p>18 through non-targeted acquisition is one aspect of</p> <p>19 interest to us.</p> <p>20 Second, our approach recognizes that</p> <p>21 objective oversight must be conducted without any</p> <p>22 preconceived notion of what our findings may be,</p>	25	<p>1 framework.</p> <p>2 Moreover, the American people should</p> <p>3 understand that we are, as far as I know, unique</p> <p>4 in the world in having such a framework that</p> <p>5 explicitly recognizes and protects privacy</p> <p>6 interests.</p> <p>7 That said, we are not purporting to</p> <p>8 undertake in the first instance a comprehensive</p> <p>9 review of all activities implicating Executive</p> <p>10 Order 12333, or implying that we will be in a</p> <p>11 position to draw generalized conclusions about</p> <p>12 those activities or the 12333 framework itself.</p> <p>13 In short, this is not a fishing</p> <p>14 expedition or a means to deliver pre-ordained</p> <p>15 solutions in search of a problem, nor are we</p> <p>16 setting expectations that we will be completing</p> <p>17 our work on 12333-related activities any time in</p> <p>18 the near future.</p> <p>19 Instead, this work plan recognizes that</p> <p>20 we will be looking at counterterrorism activities</p> <p>21 conducted within the 12333 framework for the life</p> <p>22 of our agency, and this is simply a first step.</p>

26	<p>1 I hope and expect that now we will turn</p> <p>2 to our internal operating procedures and</p> <p>3 standardizing our interactions with Intelligence</p> <p>4 Community agencies and our congressional</p> <p>5 committees of oversight.</p> <p>6 As a permanent agency of the United</p> <p>7 States government, we need our own rules of the</p> <p>8 road designed to clarify how we will fulfill our</p> <p>9 oversight and advice functions, which may</p> <p>10 sometimes be in tension, and how the governing</p> <p>11 structure of our agency can be organized to lead</p> <p>12 to decisions that are most likely to reflect the</p> <p>13 best of our diverse set of viewpoints and</p> <p>14 backgrounds.</p> <p>15 It is simply good government to</p> <p>16 regularize our interactions and procedures, and</p> <p>17 it is now overdue, given the increased size of</p> <p>18 our agency and our expanding efforts to fulfill</p> <p>19 both the oversight and advice functions.</p> <p>20 Thank you.</p> <p>21 CHAIRMAN MEDINE: Mr. Dempsey.</p> <p>22 MR. DEMPSEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.</p>
27	<p>1 Thank you for your leadership in bringing us to</p> <p>2 this point, and for the hard work of the staff</p> <p>3 and the other Board members as well, as we've</p> <p>4 sharpened our focus here.</p> <p>5 I'm pleased to support this plan for the</p> <p>6 next phase of our work regarding counterterrorism</p> <p>7 activities under Executive Order 12333.</p> <p>8 It took longer for us to get to this</p> <p>9 point than I would have wanted, but we ended up</p> <p>10 in a good place, and with this plan the Board is</p> <p>11 well-positioned to make a positive contribution</p> <p>12 to some relatively unexplored areas within its</p> <p>13 jurisdiction.</p> <p>14 This work plan actually represents the</p> <p>15 third phase of the Board's work with respect to</p> <p>16 Executive Order 12333.</p> <p>17 Eighteen months ago, we noted that the</p> <p>18 Attorney General guidelines called for under the</p> <p>19 executive order were, in the case of a number of</p> <p>20 agencies, very outdated.</p> <p>21 Because the executive order is of</p> <p>22 necessity broad and high level in its</p>
28	<p>1 requirements and policies, the Attorney General</p> <p>2 guidelines, and the even more detailed procedures</p> <p>3 and regulations promulgated under them, are</p> <p>4 crucial in translating into reality the executive</p> <p>5 order's promise of respect for civil liberties.</p> <p>6 The Chairman wrote to the Attorney</p> <p>7 General and the Director of National Intelligence</p> <p>8 in August 2013, urging them to expedite the</p> <p>9 process of updating these guidelines.</p> <p>10 Unfortunately, little progress has been</p> <p>11 made in that regard. In February of this year,</p> <p>12 we issued a short report summarizing the outdated</p> <p>13 status of the Attorney General guidelines.</p> <p>14 A second phase of our work has occurred</p> <p>15 over the past six to eight months as the Board</p> <p>16 has been working to obtain an overview</p> <p>17 understanding of 12333 activities. That phase is</p> <p>18 drawing to a close, as we have received or soon</p> <p>19 will receive briefings from all of the agencies</p> <p>20 that comprise the Intelligence Community.</p> <p>21 These briefings have helped the Board</p> <p>22 understand the breadth of activities conducted</p>
29	<p>1 under 12333, which reach well beyond</p> <p>2 counterterrorism, and many of which do not</p> <p>3 implicate the civil liberties of Americans at</p> <p>4 all.</p> <p>5 Now we are entering this new phase,</p> <p>6 which will be based on two deep dives into</p> <p>7 specific activities or types of activities</p> <p>8 conducted for counterterrorism purposes under</p> <p>9 12333.</p> <p>10 We will adopt in this work plan specific</p> <p>11 criteria for selecting programs for these</p> <p>12 in-depth examinations, and I think those criteria</p> <p>13 are relevant to ongoing activities and</p> <p>14 examinations beyond the two at this phase,</p> <p>15 focusing on activities affecting the rights of</p> <p>16 Americans and limited to activities that have a</p> <p>17 significant counterterrorism purpose.</p> <p>18 A word about what it means to be looking</p> <p>19 at counterterrorism programs or activities under</p> <p>20 E.O. 12333. As other Board members have noted,</p> <p>21 this executive order provides the framework in</p> <p>22 which all of the government's foreign</p>

Basically everything, or 3 essentially everything the intelligence agencies 4 do fits within the 12333 architecture.</p> <p>5 Therefore, a large percentage of the 6 programs and activities that the Board will look 7 at in the course of its existence will fall to 8 some extent under 12333.</p> <p>9 When we talk today about examining 10 activities under 12333, the Board is primarily 11 referring to activities that are not regulated by 12 a statute such as FISA. These activities not 13 regulated by statute are regulated by Attorney 14 General guidelines, as I referenced, and 15 procedures, often very detailed, issued by agency 16 heads for specific functions, or programs, or 17 types of activity. All of these guidelines, 18 regulations, and procedures trace their legal 19 source to the executive order.</p> <p>20 Primarily, when we are talking about 21 activities under 12333 not regulated by statute, 22 we are talking about activities occurring outside</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">32</p> <p>1 activities conducted for counterterrorism 2 purposes under Executive Order 12333.</p> <p>3 The deep dives on selected 12333 4 activities that we will conduct as part of this 5 phase of our work will provide a grounding for 6 any general conclusions we might draw about the 7 12333 framework and its implementing guidelines, 8 regulations, and procedures.</p> <p>9 I want to stress, as other Board members 10 have, that at the same time the Board is 11 undertaking this important but delicate work, we 12 are also still working to establish the full 13 panoply of procedures required of an independent 14 agency within the executive branch.</p> <p>15 This is not easy. Our building here is 16 scheduled to be torn down, so we are busy finding 17 new office space that meets both our security 18 requirements and our mandate to inform the 19 public.</p> <p>20 We are subject to the Sunshine Act, 21 which imposes serious burdens on the effective 22 functioning of an agency.</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">31</p> <p>1 the United States.</p> <p>2 However, in this age of globalized 3 commerce when many Americans have business ties 4 or family ties to people overseas, and especially 5 when information and communication systems are 6 globalized, intelligence activities overseas are 7 more likely than ever to collect information 8 about U.S. persons.</p> <p>9 That, and the fact that non-Americans 10 also have a right to privacy under international 11 treaties to which the U.S. government is a party, 12 make it appropriate for us to look at activities 13 not specifically targeting Americans to assess 14 the privacy impact of those programs or 15 activities.</p> <p>16 In our reports on Section 215 and 17 Section 702 of FISA, the Board demonstrated that 18 we prefer, as other Board members have noted, to 19 deeply understand a program or activity before we 20 seek to draw conclusions about it.</p> <p>21 That approach is, if anything, even more 22 important with respect to our review of</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">33</p> <p>1 We are working diligently to clarify 2 procedures defining how we approach the quite 3 disparate, and as one Board member indicated, 4 sometimes in tension, roles that Congress has 5 assigned to us to provide advice within the 6 executive branch, and to provide oversight of the 7 executive branch.</p> <p>8 Staff and Board members are laboring 9 mightily to address these issues, at the same 10 time that the challenges of the security 11 clearance process delay our efforts to bring on a 12 permanent general counsel and a congressional 13 liaison.</p> <p>14 Despite all these difficulties, I hope 15 that the Board, through its staff, can move 16 quickly to identify the two deep dives that will 17 be the focus of this next phase of our work so 18 that we can begin to address the understandable 19 public concerns about counterterrorism activities 20 in this age of big data and globalized 21 communications.</p> <p>22 Likewise, I hope that we will receive</p>

So I 5 think that we are at the point where we should 6 move ahead.</p> <p>7 And finally, I just want to emphasize 8 there has been some discussion here about our 9 statutory functions, which of course are very 10 important. As one of the our colleagues reminded 11 us, the advice function can be very important and 12 it requires that we have the cooperation and the 13 trust of the intelligence agencies.
